4. Educate and involve students in ethical principles and social responsibility in a diverse world.
5. Provide students with opportunities to demonstrate effective communication skills, both oral and written, and to develop interpersonal communication skills.
6. Emphasize career preparation and work habits, such as problem solving from evidence-based literature, how psychology content related to business and workplace settings, research for solutions, and teamwork.
